
TABC TRACE Program


The Texas Alcohol Beverage Commission

(TABC) manages a program called Target Responsibility for Alcohol-Connected Emergencies (TRACE). TRACE is a law enforcement operation that investigates the source of alcohol service when crimes involve serious injury or death. These crimes can include motor vehicle crashes, homicides, sexual assaults, or other crimes where alcohol was a contributing factor.

This program was managed on a regional level until January of 2021, when TABC centralized the division under one command. There are nine investigators that are primary focused on the major metropolitan areas of Texas. When they are contacted by local law enforcement, the investigators are dispatched to help investigate the case. There is a hotline available for law enforcement to place a phone call to TABC TRACE investigators at 833-TABCLAW, if they do not have a direct contact. The ultimate goal is to foster relationships with local law enforcement agencies so they will have a direct line of contact.



The investigations typically begin quickly (within 12 hours) after the crimes have occurred. Investigators will work to determine if a licensed TABC establishment was involved in the service or sale of alcohol to the individual who committed the crime. They will collect videos, receipts, and witness statements from the establishment and turn



When these cases are taken to court, local law enforcement will assist the prosecution in providing evidence for crimes such as intoxication manslaughter, intoxication assault, or homicide. In these cases, TABC investigators may be called as a witness. When a Class A misdemeanor is filed against an employee of a TABC licensed facility, TABC will be the one to bring forward the evidence to the court.

A restrained administrative case refers to a legal presumption that an employee's actions will not be attributed to the

business of the employer, otherwise called <u>Safe Harbor</u>. These enforcement actions can occur at an on-premise sale location such as a bar or restaurant, as well as an off-premise location, in the case of a retail location, when the alcohol is sold to a visibly intoxicated customer or alcohol is sold to a minor. There are graduated sanctions for repeat offenses based on the <u>TABC</u> penalty chart.

Annually in Texas there are approximately 3,200-3,500 fatalities per year of which 33% are alcohol involved. TABC conducts assessments in approximately 1,100-1,200 of those cases and actively investigates about 200-300 complaints. Complaints are allegations of overservice or sale to a minor in which a formal, full-length investigation is required. The move to a centralized command has helped the TRACE program to be more successful. TABC has opened between 250-300 cases this year and is finding violations in approximately 25% of complaints investigated.

The TABC TRACE program earned the Outstanding Agency Award from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the Southeast Chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD). Other strong supporters of the program include prosecutors, Sean Teare of the Harris County District Attorney's Office, and Joe Gonzales of the Bexar County District Attorney's Office. Law enforcement also has strong support for the program from Department of Public Safety Director, Colonel Steven McCraw and Houston Chief of Police, Troy Finner. These individuals and organizations understand the value of TABC's role in holding server/ sellers accountable for overservice and sales to minors when it impacts public safety. 
